### Chair's Notes April 2023

# Speeding

The danger from speeding traffic was among parishioners' top concerns in the last two village opinion surveys in 2001 and 2011. Things have only got worse over the decade since, with traffic swollen by thousands of new houses in Whiteley and Boorley Green.

Thanks to the efforts of Dave Thorne in managing our speed limit reminder devices, we now have extensive data on Botley Road (B3035) and Lockhams Road. We plan to get further devices, to cover Wangfield Lane, Curdridge Lane and the A3051 in Curbridge.

Although most drivers do observe the speed limit, there are still terrifyingly many racers. Somebody drove along Botley Road at 100 mph at 11:50am on February 1<sup>st</sup>!

In the second half of January, over 15% of drivers broke the limit on Botley Road. Among these, more than 1400 would have got a penalty if they had been caught by the Police. As they approached the device by the Plantation, the drivers would already have seen they were speeding from our other unit further north.

We are hoping that this large number of speeders will encourage the Police to carry out formal enforcement action.

Speedwatch volunteers have also noticed that the proportion of speeders falls when traffic is heavy – not surprising as one law-abiding driver can prevent those behind from speeding. That might be why the number breaking the 40mph limit on Lockhams Road was relatively low, though I'd prefer to think it was people being sensible in a built-up area. 85% were going 34mph or less, so a 30mph limit would not be much of an inconvenience.

## **Buses**

Curdridge PC is working with neighbouring parishes and our County Councillor to avoid the hardship that will be caused by the decision to withdraw the Xelabus X9 service. At the same time, we are hoping to get a service to Whiteley from Reading Room Lane, though that will be of limited help to people at the far end of the village.

# Coronation

At its next meetings, the Council will be looking for ways to coordinate Coronation celebrations, and would welcome ideas from parishioners.
