Chair's Notes June 2023

Coronation Picnic

It was wonderful to see the Reading Room buzzing with activity on Coronation Monday.

Thanks go to the Reading Room trustees and the Burden family, who decorated the main hall with bunting and laid out the tables – it wasn't long before every table was in use. Delicious cakes were on sale by the Reading Room charity, along with tea, coffee, soft drinks and snacks. More parties took place in the billiard room and the room behind the stage, and the Cricket Club staged a popular barbecue outside their bar.

Although we'd originally been hoping for a sunny day to picnic on the recreation ground, the early rain meant we switched to celebrating indoors. There was a real community spirit in the building, with people moving between tables and getting to know each other. We were also entertained by the wonderful voice of Bronte Whittle, who accompanied herself on the guitar.

The event may also have helped the village find a



minibus driver and a potential new trustee for the Reading Room charity.

Affordable Homes Again

The project group met in May and were able to celebrate real progress (at last) on building eight affordable homes next to St Peter's Close. Four builders had submitted tenders, and Hastoe (the developer) is working with them on details to whittle the four down to two and then down to one – a contractor will have been chosen by the time you read this. Hastoe will then be able to bid for funding from Homes England, with a view to starting work this summer for completion late in 2024.

To be eligible to apply for one of the five rented properties, prospective tenants need to be on the Winchester Housing list, and people with a strong connection to the village will have priority when it comes to allocating the houses.

The three shared ownership homes will be sold at https://hastoesales.com/ when they are available, again with priority given to people with a village connection. To ensure that the houses continue to be used by local people, Hastoe will retain at least a 20% stake in each property.

Curdridge Transport Crisis

Cllr Lynne Newton has talked to many of the people who used to travel on the X9 bus, and has proposed occasional expeditions to Hedge End or Whiteley shops, using Bishops Waltham's minibus. That could probably be offered two Tuesdays a month if there is demand.

The Stagecoach 49 route currently goes through the village one way and returns another, so many people can't get back to their starting point. We are working with Hampshire County Council to persuade the operator to switch to a route that visits the same stops in both directions, but we can't force such a change.
