Speed Limit Reminders

You will have seen the new reminder devices now operating on Lockhams Road and the B3035. We are grateful to Dave Thorne, who is looking after them and processing the data they collect for us. This has already demonstrated the need for Police enforcement of speed limits – limits that are intended to keep us safe on the many rat-runs through Curdridge. We are hoping to sell the surviving accessories for the old Evolis reminder unit to nearby parishes who still use that brand.

Please Help Protect the Gap between Whiteley and Curdridge

The draft Local Plan for Winchester is now out for consultation – you can review it at https://democracy.winchester.gov.uk/documents/s22797/Regulation%2018%20Consultation%20Plan.pdf or (more simply) from a link on the Parish Council home page: https://www.curdridge-pc.gov.uk/

You may remember that many plots of land along the A3051 were offered to Winchester City Council (WCC) as SHELAA sites, which means only that their owners would be happy to sell them for development. When the SHELAA list was published, it appeared that the policy of protecting settlement gaps would avoid north Whiteley expanding to meet the village of Curdridge.

Unfortunately, this no longer seems to be the case. The draft Plan explicitly protects only a few gaps between settlements, and the gaps around Curdridge are not among those shown in the Plan under Policy NE7. It's not at all obvious why certain gaps were chosen, but not the gap between urban Whiteley and rural Curdridge.

The Parish Council has engaged a consultant to help make a case for this valuable open space between town and village to be added to NE7. It would really help if villagers used the consultation to make clear that this gap is something they really care about. We'll put the link on the Parish website to make it easy for you to respond.

There are other policies that discourage development between settlements, and those are probably what we will have to rely on to avoid ribbon development between Curdridge and Boorley Green.

Please make your views known to Winchester City Council.

Affordable Housing – Botley Road, next to St Peter's Close

With agreement reached between Winchester, Hastoe and the landowner, all we are now waiting for is the formal Planning Permission for the application submitted 16 months ago. I am not going to tempt providence by repeating last month's prediction that it would be granted by the time you read this, but as soon as it is, we will be able to get new quotations for the building and pursue available grant funding.
