## **Meetings**

At the Council's Zoom meeting on 3 September, we are due to make a decision on whether it is safe to return to physical meetings in the Reading Rooms. Please join us, and let us know your views. ### Wangfield Lane

It is now confirmed that the bridge is to be removed, which is bad news for those of us who live on this rat-run, as it will allow even higher vehicles to roar past our houses. I have asked Hampshire County Council to consider making a traffic regulation order (TRO) to stop heavy vehicles from using Maddoxford/Wangfield lanes as a through route, but I know they are loath to make TROs because of cost and the difficulty of enforcing them. Council will also be discussing this matter at its Full Council Meeting on 3 September 2020.

The information on <u>one.network/</u> suggests the roadworks will be finished on 24 August, but that seems unlikely.

## **North Whiteley**

The opening date for Bluebell Way seems to be slipping at calendar speed, so my suggestion last month that we might see it by the end of August now seems very over-optimistic.

Winchester are taking enforcement action to remove the unlawful Taylor Wimpey sign at the *Horse and Jockey*. Although Curdridge Parish Council owns the land it stands on, we were not asked for permission, and would not have granted it. Taylor Wimpey's action contrasts badly with that of Bovis, who sought planning permission for their signs by the A3051.

#### **Bonfires**

I was shocked to be told that "Bonfires are banned because of Covid-19." In practice, they're not actually illegal, but there are strong moral reasons not to light any at present. The presence of particulates in the air seems to make a Covid-19 infection much more severe – you'll have heard the concerns about this on urban bus and lorry routes, but bonfires can load the country air with particulates too – see <a href="www.winchester.gov.uk/environment/nuisance/bonfires">www.winchester.gov.uk/environment/nuisance/bonfires</a>

## **Affordable Housing**

At an online meeting on 11 August, developer Hastoe reported that the Ecological survey of the site by St Peters Close is complete, and suggests that we should check for the presence of dormice in a nearby hedge, and check the field for reptiles. The land-owner happily consented to these studies, so don't be surprised to see sheets of metal among the maize – reptiles will be attracted to bask on them, facilitating a count. Now we know where the electric cables really are, the architect might have to move one of the houses planned at the bottom of the site a few feet to make it safe to erect scaffolding during building. The sewer through the site has been mapped, and causes no problems for our design.

Action Hampshire has interviewed the main participants in this development, and will post a short film on their web-site when we're a little further on. We decided to try to get photos of the work as it progresses, and St Peter's Church has kindly granted us access to the tower as a suitable vantage point.
